OVERVIEW

The highlight of the year has been the increased interest, in and activity of Tulía United Nations Youth Association ,due to the hard work and enthusiasm of Harriet Glen and Julie Herraman and their executive committee. Their competence has resulted in the organisation of student meentings and conferences being left one of our aims since International Youth Year; to train and encourage young people to run their busy programs of social fundraising and to run their busy programs of social, fundraising and awareness raising events. Not only have attendances been good, but there is strong competition for the S.A. places to the National Youth Conference in Tasmania.

Our continuing provision of school packs (twice this year) has meant a building up of resources in school libraries. This is an important part of our work, especially with the introduction of the Australian Studies course of SACE. With increasing attention to the UN ,we have had many enquiries for information from secondary and tertiary, students, as well as teachers, academics and government departments.

Without our band of volunteers we could not provide this service. Half of our grant from Norman Percy Cole Foundation is used to support our work in schools and with our secondary students especially those at a disadvantage.

This year, the other half of our Norman Percy Cole Trust grant was used to provide Encouragement Grants of up to \$50 to Playgroups, Child-Parent Centres, Child Care groups and primary schools to help them with activities during Childrens Week. It was good to be able to spread the grants across the State, and to see the wide range of events. Many focussed on providing Healthy Breakfasts.

Another important focus during the year has been the sponsorship of the Women Against Demeaning Images Campaign by our Status of Women Committee (together with other women's groups. UNYA (SA DIVISION) REPORT 1992 - 1993

"If in this world we can produce enough properly guided people, we won't need guided missiles"

Despite my limited experience, it appears to me that all conferences on issues such as disarmament, racism, and the environment, conclude that "education" is the key to a long-term solution. In a small way, the United Nations Youth Association is providing this education.

In July 1993 South Australia was represented by seven delegates: Rachel Cameron, Georgia Glen, Tom Griffith, Emma Kirby, Nastasha Polites, and Mark Smith, at the UN Youth Conference in Tasmania (they were also accompanied by two heroic leaders called Van and Harriet who felt like proud parents when Nastasha won the Barr trophy for best delegate).

The first event after the August AGM was the September General Meeting when Bruce McKay spoke to us about the structure, purpose, and activities of UNICEF. He presented several reasons why the lives of children should be improved, which left us asking the question, "Why would anyone prefer to buy a submarine, rather than help a child?".

October began with a panel of speakers on the issue of Animal Vivisection. On Friday, 9th the State Conference was held at Wilderness School. There were three sessions - the first was on conflict resolution (run by Valerie Redman), the second was on communication skills (run by Gus Saunders), and the third was on leadership techniques (run by AIESEC). By the end of the Conference we had learnt that in order to resolve conflict you must want to resolve it, that effective communication requires understanding, and that the problem with world leaders is that they never attended an UNYA Conference. The month concluded with a dinner at the Phoenician Restaurant.

In November we invited two bright and spritely people called Jennifer and Justin to tell us about the Wilderness Society. A month later, at the December General Meeting we held a fierce and energetic debate on the meaning of Christmas, and on December 11th UNYA members received a rare opportunity to demonstrate their quirky talents and to laugh at each other at a weekend camp in the Adelaide Hills.

In January we held the traditional paper and candle making day, and in February we heard about Emily Sharp's experiences in the Horn of Africa. At the March General Meeting Sam Knottenbelt enthusiastically told us about Urban Ecology and the Halifax project (several UNYA members consequently got involved in a letter-writing campaign), and on the 14th & 15th we held another State Conference at Seymour college (when we faced the gratifying but awkward situation of receiving 150 applications for 75 places).

On 4 April Philip White from PeACe spoke to us about the Nurrungar Campaign. Although opinion was divided as to the bases, all of us were subsequently shocked by the sensationalist and marginalising approach taken by the Australian media. A few weeks later we held a quiz night at Pembroke School. and on May 2 we participated in the Challenging Racism Simulation Game, run by Suzy Stiles from GAP, where we experienced the anger and depression created by discrimination.

Future events include the Rotary mock UN General Assembly, and a "Creativity Workshop" at the June General Meeting.

The past twelve months have been a busy time for UNYA. Although we are certainly not changing the world overnight, I think we are contributing to the development of "properly guided people".
