





TYPES OF CO-OPERATIVES

PRODUCER Run by people like farmers, taxi drivers and fishers who provide similar goods and services. They can club together to buy supplies or market their businesses.

CONSUMER Provide goods and services to their members/owners. Can be huge or very small; anything from co-op supermarkets, housing co-ops or small-scale food co-ops.

WORKER Fire the boss! Often small businesses like print shops, daycare, or small manufacturing that are owned and managed by their employees.

FINANCIAL SERVICES Entities like credit unions and insurance co-ops offer banking, investment and insurance services to their members.

PURCHASING Owners of private businesses like hotels, hardware stores and grocery shops band together to buy in bulk, combining purchasing to get better prices.

Sendler and Zegota devised several routes for smuggling children out of the ghetto. Other methods were more inventive. For instance, a trolley driver and Zegota member, when crossing from the ghetto to the Aryan side, hid little ones in trunks, suitcases, or sacks under his back seat, where the Nazi quards could not see, Another supporter, an ambulance driver, kept his dog beside him in the front seat and trained him to bark to camouflage any cries or noises from the babies hidden under stretchers in back. Sendler also arranged for babies and children to be sedated and smuggled out with merchants in potato sacks, under their loads of goods. Sometimes, she even sneaked sedated children out in body bags, tell-

Dear friends,

I wanted to let you know that I have decided the time is right to step down as National Director. Of course, GetUp will continue its work, and I can't wait to see what comes next.

When I first took on this role in September 2008, many were still wondering whether this movement of ordinary people could continue to make a difference, or whether it would invariably prove a momentary trend; a flash in the political landscape. Over the years you have proven that this movement of everyday Australians has the capacity to take on and win tough fights and strengthen democracy in the process.

GetUp is driven by its members. Over and over again we've demonstrated unequivocally that all of us working together can change things for the better. It has been an honour to stand alongside you over these last four years.

While we celebrate what we have won we should remember what we're still campaigning for: a nation that better reflects the generosity of spirit, innate sense of fairness, strong community pride and ever-ready humour of its people. It was January 15, 2004, and TomDispatch had only been in existence for a year when Chalmers Johnson, author of the prophetic book <u>Blowback</u> (published in 2000 and a bestseller after the 9/11 attacks), did a piece for this site entitled "<u>America's Empire of Bases</u>." He wrote then: "Due to government secrecy, our citizens are often ignorant of the fact that our garrisons encircle the planet. This vast network of American bases on every continent except Antarctica actually constitutes a new form of empire -- an empire of bases with its own geography not likely to be taught in any high school geography class. Without grasping the dimensions of this globegirdling Baseworld, one can't begin to understand the size and nature of our imperial aspirations or the degree to which a new kind of militarism is undermining our constitutional order."

The True Cost of an Iphone

- The Iphone is a
 wonderful piece of
 modern technology! It
 provides us with many
 applications and

 what cost we pay for the
 Iphone to come into
 existence?
- In 2007: 1,389,000 people purchased Iphones.
- In 2011 this figure jumped dramatically to 72,300,000, that's 52 xs as many as when it was launched.
- That year also saw Apple's highest revenue in history a whopping \$108.25 billion.
- > But before it can start bringing in the money, the Iphone travels a long road to reach the happy hands of Apple aficionados, and it starts with the elements.
- Coltan contains a heat resistant substance that can hold a high electrical charge, and is a staple component of every Iphone. Up to 80% of the world's Coltan reserves are located in the Democratic Republic of Congo.
- Over 18 months of bloody warfare, the Rwandan army made over \$250 million stealing Coltan for the DR Congo.
- As they're being produced little phones have a big impact on the environment, and it's starting to show.
- In 2011, Apple conducted 229 audits amongst its 158 global suppliers.
- > 58 did not monitor and control air emissions.

- 69 did not recycle or dispose of hazardous waste as required by law
- 112 had not properly stored or handled hazardous chemicals.
- 43.2% of China's statemonitored rivers are classified as unsuitable for human contact.
- Each year 750,000 Chinese citizens die from air pollution.
- By the year 2030, China's carbon dioxide emissions could equal the entire world's CO2 production today.
- Pricey products come from cheap labour. But what's the real cost?
- One of Apple's most notorious supplier plants is manufacturing titan Foxconn.
- > At a single factory in Shenzhen, China, 90 Iphones are produced every minute.
- That's \$17,910 worth of Iphones, 11 times what a Foxconn factory worker makes in a year.
- > 2007: 18 workers attempted suicide at a Foxconn plant.
- One year later 50 workers threatened to do the same.
- There are over 5 million Iphone Apps available.
- About 1 billion Apps purchased each month. At an average cost of \$1.37 per App, that's about \$16.4 billion in Apps each year.
- > From 2007 to the release of 2011's 4S, Apple's Iphone profits have grown by over 137%.
- This growth is expected to continue with the release of the Iphone 5 in 2012.
- As Iphones have gained popularity, over half the population has developed Nomophobia: fear of being without a cell phone.
- When a new Iphone appears, old models fall into disuse.
- With Iphone generations appearing, it's estimated

- that in the U.S. in 2011, as many as 36,750,000 Iphones were discarded in favour of the newer model.
- Up to 80% of recycled Iphones are shipped to places like Guiyu, China, where they're stripped of valuable parts.
- > Because of the waste in Guiyu, pregnant women there are six times more likely to miscarry.
- Guiyu has the highest levels of cancer causing dioxins in the world.
- > 7 out of 10 children have too much lead in their blood.
- What can you do to be a responsible consumer?
- Reuse instead of recycle.
- Reusing your old Iphone by selling to a friend or to a used electronics shop extends the life of your Iphone and maximises its usage.
- If you're going to recycle your phone, ask questions. Get in touch with your local electronics recycler and inquire into their methods.
- ➤ In its first weekend alone, 1.7 million Iphone 4S were sold, but the 4S model was released only 16 months later.

The Magna Carta Shredded Before Our Eyes

Editor's note: This column is adapted from an address by Noam Chomsky on June 19 at the University of St. Andrews in Fife, Scotland, as part of its 600th anniversary celebration.

July 19, 2012 "<u>Information Clearing House</u>" -- Recent events trace a threatening trajectory, sufficiently so that it may be worthwhile to look ahead a few generations to the millennium anniversary of one of the great events in the establishment of civil and human rights: the issuance of Magna Carta, the charter of English liberties imposed on King John in 1215.

What we do right now, or fail to do, will determine what kind of world will greet that anniversary. It is not an attractive prospect – not least because the Great Charter is being shredded before our eyes.

The first scholarly edition of the Magna Carta was published in 1759 by the English jurist William Blackstone, whose work was a source for U.S. constitutional law. It was entitled "The Great Charter and the Charter of the Forest," following earlier practice. Both charters are highly significant today.

The first, the Charter of Liberties, is widely recognized to be the cornerstone of the fundamental rights of the English-speaking peoples – or as Winston Churchill put it more expansively, "the charter of every self-respecting man at any time in any land."

In 1679 the Charter was enriched by the Habeas Corpus Act, formally titled "an Act for the better securing the liberty of the subject, and for prevention of imprisonment beyond the seas." The modern harsher version is called "rendition" – imprisonment for the purpose of torture.

Along with much of English law, the Act was incorporated into the U.S. Constitution, which affirms that "the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended" except in case of rebellion or invasion. In 1961, the U.S. Supreme Court held that the rights guaranteed by this Act were "(c)onsidered by the Founders as the highest safeguard of liberty."

More specifically, the Constitution provides that no "person (shall) be deprived of life, liberty or property, without due process of law (and) a speedy and public trial" by peers.

The Department of Justice has recently explained that these guarantees are satisfied by internal deliberations in the executive branch, as Jo Becker and Scott Shane reported in *The New York Times* on May 29. Barack Obama, the constitutional lawyer in the White House, agreed. King John would have nodded with satisfaction.

The underlying principle of "presumption of innocence" has also been given an original interpretation. In the calculus of the president's "kill list" of terrorists, "all military-age males in a strike zone" are in effect counted as combatants "unless there is explicit

intelligence posthumously proving them innocent," Becker and Shane summarized. Thus post-assassination determination of innocence now suffices to maintain the sacred principle.

This is the merest sample of the dismantling of "the charter of every self-respecting man."

Graduate becomes SA's first UN Youth Representative

The United Nations Youth Representative for Australia is a little closer to home this year after Bachelor of Management (Marketing) graduate, Dan Ryan (pictured right), became the first South Australian to be appointed to the role.

Ryan's role involves a national listening tour of all states and territories to consult with Australian youth and run workshops, before giving a speech in the United Nations (UN) General Assembly in New York in September. He will then report back on another tour around the country.

Ryan says his vision is to empower and engage the youth of Australia by bringing his five years of professional experience and his skill set in marketing and social media to the role.



"More than 6000 people will have direct, face-to-face interaction with someone who will represent them at the UN General Assembly," he says.

"They are going to have the opportunity to present what's important to them directly to someone who's outside the sphere of government, politics and policy."

And he has opened the communication channels to organisations and young people all across Australia through his distinctive website, http://www.unyouthrep.com.

The platform offers young people the opportunity to identify and share solutions that are working in their local community.

"It takes them five minutes to enter a solution to a problem, which populates a map to show where it's happening," Ryan says.

"The vision is to be able to create synergies right across Australia.

"People can write, like, rate, discuss, tweet and share it. If a solution is working in Meningie, why can't it work in Melbourne?"

From graffiti removal to healthy lunch schemes, from addressing minority disadvantage to refugee issues, contributions and discussions will go into reports which will be sent to MPs and senators in local areas, calling for action and change on the issues that matter to young Australians across the country.

Ryan was working on social development programs with Austraining International before he accepted the role in early May. Austraining provided principal sponsorship and he is continuing to raise supporting sponsorship for his role, which is a voluntary position.

Ryan is no stranger to the voluntary world. He volunteered for about two months in Cambodia, was the promotions manager for the Live Below the Line campaign and the state coordinator for the Global Poverty Project.

He also has extensive skills developed through his professional and public speaking experience.

At 19, Ryan became marketing coordinator at Harris Scarfe, finishing his marketing degree with three years of work experience.

"My passion is simply connecting with people and making a difference," he said.

"It's motivated by my personal faith, what I believe the purpose of life is about and on an experience base.

"Out of over a billion that live in extreme poverty, some of those are friends from overseas or even Australia, so when I see those types of numbers, faces, names and personalities come to mind.

"That's going to motivate me to use these skills in the best possible way."
